# YOUR GUIDE TO PLAYING IT SAFE DURING RUGBY WORLD CUP 2011

As host of Rugby World Cup 2011, New Zealand is pulling out all the stops to make the tournament memorable and totally awesome.

We're also taking great care to ensure our visitors and residents are kept safe both at the games and beyond.

You can play your part and make your visit extra special by following our guide to staying safe while in New Zealand.



- » Intoxicated people, by law, cannot be served alcohol or allowed entry to licenced premises e.g. pubs, cafes, bars and hotels.
- » Intoxicated people may be asked to leave Rugby World Cup venues and licenced premises within Fanzones. Refusing to leave may lead to arrest.
- » Ample food, low and non-alcoholic drinks plus free drinking water will be available at Rugby World Cup venues and licenced premises within Fanzones.
- » Look after your friends and drink alcohol responsibly.

## KEEPING SAFE OUTDOORS

New Zealand is the perfect destination for all types of outdoor adventure and activity. Before heading into your chosen pursuit, make sure you follow the Outdoor Safety Code – [www.outdoorsafetycode.co.nz](http://www.outdoorsafetycode.co.nz) and [www.adventuresmart.org.nz](http://www.adventuresmart.org.nz).

While enjoying the outdoors please don't remove any plants, or other natural resources. Visit [www.leavenotrace.org.nz](http://www.leavenotrace.org.nz) for more information.

- » If you arrive at the gate in a drunken state you will be refused entry.
- » Park your vehicle well away from the ground to avoid traffic congestion
- » Where possible use public transport to get to the ground.

- » Driving under the influence of alcohol or drugs is a crime. Penalties are severe and your vehicle could be impounded. Under section 56 of the Land Transport Act 1998 these levels are:
  - Breath – exceeds 400 micrograms (mcg) of alcohol per litre of breath
  - Blood – exceeds 80 milligrams (mg) of alcohol per 100 millilitres of blood (can be represented as .08g/100ml).
- » If driving slowly, pull over where safe and let faster traffic pass.
- » For your own safety, hitch-hiking is not recommended.

## KEEPING SAFE AROUND ALCOHOL

New Zealand has **important controls** around the buying and drinking of alcohol. Enjoy the hospitality that will be part of Rugby World Cup 2011, but please be aware of these controls and always play by the rules.

- » The legal age for the purchase of alcohol is 18. If you look 25 years or younger, proof of age may be asked for.
- » The only acceptable forms of proof-of-age are an Overseas Passport, a NZ Passport, a NZ Drivers License or the Hospitality Association of New Zealand (HANZ) 18+ card.
- » Most New Zealand towns and cities have **liquor bans** in designated public places e.g. central business districts or alongside stadiums.
- » Drinking alcohol or having an open container of alcohol in a **liquor ban** area, could lead to arrest and a court appearance.
- » Drinking alcohol while on public transport, including taxis will attract a fine of up to \$300.



## KEEPING SAFE VIA TEXT MESSAGING

New Zealand mobile phone providers Telecom, Vodafone and 2degrees Mobile offer a text messaging service for visitors.

You can text updates about your location and travel movements to 7233 [SAFE]. These details are kept on a central database which can be accessed on request by Police to help locate you.

It is also a good idea to leave detailed information about your travel plans with friends and/or family back home.

## RUGBY WORLD CUP 2011 VENUES – TIPS

- » Check the back of your tickets for terms and conditions of entry into the venue
- » Arrive early to avoid delays in getting to your seats
- » You will be asked to open bags to check for alcohol and anything that may be considered a security risk e.g. knives

# CALL 111 IN AN EMERGENCY

If you have an emergency and need a quick response from Police, the Fire Service or Ambulance, dial 111. The call is free.

## KEEPING YOURSELF SAFE

- » Avoid walking alone in isolated places late at night. Stay in well-lit areas where there are other people. Be aware of your surroundings.
- » Take a taxi or arrange for someone you know to pick you up.
- » Don't carry around large amounts of cash or expensive jewellery.
- » Avoid accepting drinks from strangers in bars, and don't leave your drink unattended. Remember, alcohol and drugs can affect your judgement.
- » Don't accept rides from people you don't know.
- » Carry a mobile phone with you and call New Zealand's emergency phone number if you feel unsafe or threatened. Call 111.
- » If you have information on a crime that you wish to report anonymously, please call CRIMESTOPPERS 0800 555 111

## KEEPING YOUR STUFF SAFE

- » Always lock your accommodation or vehicle and keep windows secure.
- » Don't leave valuables visible in parked cars or campervans, especially at scenic spots or trail heads. Lock them in the vehicle's boot (trunk).

- » Store your valuables securely, ideally in a safe at your accommodation.
- » Carry important documents with you e.g. passport, credit cards, and traveller's cheques. Keep copies of these documents separate from the originals.
- » Keep a record of the description and serial numbers of your valuable items e.g. camcorder or digital camera.
- » Park your campervan overnight in a holiday park, Department of Conservation camping ground or other specially designated area. If in doubt, ask the nearest i-SITE.
- » Don't leave maps, luggage or visitor brochures visible in your vehicle.
- » Don't leave bags, backpacks, wallets or cameras unattended in public places e.g. airports, railway stations or ferry terminals.
- » Report lost or stolen possessions to the nearest Police Station.

## KEEPING YOUR CREDIT CARDS AND IDENTITY SAFE

- » Be careful who you give personal information to.
- » Minimise the number of cards and ID you carry in your wallet.
- » Keep an eye on your credit card every time you use it, and make sure you get it back as quickly as possible. Try not to let your credit card out of your sight whenever possible.

- » Keep your credit cards in a purse or wallet close to your body where it can't easily be snatched away.
- » Shield your credit card number and PIN so that others around you can't copy it or capture it on a cell phone or other camera.
- » **Report lost or stolen credit cards immediately.** Inform the nearest Police Station.

## KEEPING SAFE ON NEW ZEALAND ROADS

New Zealand is a small country with a good road system, yet it can take many hours to drive between cities and other destinations of interest. Take care to plan your travel routes well in advance.

- » Always rest before starting a long road trip, especially after a long flight to New Zealand.
- » **Drive on the left-hand-side** of the road and give way to your right.
- » Keep within the speed limits – they are rigorously enforced by Police. Fixed and mobile speed cameras operate throughout New Zealand.
- » You are required by law to carry your driver's licence with you at all times.
- » All vehicle drivers and passengers **must** wear a safety belt or approved child restraint at all times.
- » Helmets are **compulsory** if riding a bicycle or motorbike.
